A "certified wunderkind," according to Time magazine, novelist Jonathan Safran Foer became an international sensation with the publication of his first novel, Everything Is Illuminated, which garnered fervent praise from critics including John Updike, Joyce

Carol Oates, and Salman Rushdie, among others. "Every page is illuminated," raved Jeffrey Eugenides. It was named the "Book of the Year" by the Los Angeles Times and won several literary prizes, including the National Jewish Book Award and The Guardian First Book Award. It was adapted into a feature film starring Elijah Wood in 2005. Foer's second novel, Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close, shows the same bold narrative choices, linguistic acrobatics and virtuosic storytelling. A celebrity in the literary world, Foer entered the realm of academia as a visiting professor at Yale University in the spring of 2008.

Kim Edwards' tragic and powerful debut novel, The Memory Keeper's Daughter, was a publishing sensation which skyrocketed to the coveted #1 position on The New York Times' bestseller list. Prior to that

breakaway hit, Edwards had been an established short story writer of clear distinction. Her stories have appeared in Ploughshares, Zoetrope, Story, and The Paris Review, and she has been honored with both a National Magazine Award for Excellence in Fiction and a Pushcart Prize. Her collection of short stories, The Secrets of a Fire King, was short-listed for the PEN/Hemingway Award. A Texas native raised in Skaneateles, Edwards credits her five years teaching English in Southeast Asia with giving her the freedom and clarity needed to focus on writing. "The chatter of everyday life fell away," she says, "and it allowed me to listen more fully to the stories I wanted to tell."

One of the world's most esteemed scholars of American history, Joseph J. Ellis won the Pulitzer Prize in History for his book, Founding Brothers: The Revolutionary Generation, and the National Book Award for his book, American Sphinx: The Character of

His most recent title, American Creation: Triumphs and Tragedies at the Founding of the Republic, is both an examination of political creativity during the founding era and a compelling, beautifully written book. "Ellis is a storyteller, and a superb one too," says The New York Review of Books. He has been a featured commentator on CSPAN, CNN, and the NewsHour with Jim Lehrer. He is the Ford Foundation Professor of History at Mount Holyoke College, where his popular courses include an examination of American foreign policy since 1898.

The Paula and Edwin Sidman Fellow in the Arts at the University of Michigan, he teaches in a collaborative program of the psychology and humanities departments devoted to the psychology of humor.

A native of Mumbai, India, now living in Maryland, Manil Suri received international accolades for his bestselling debut novel, *The Death of Vishnu*, a finalist for the PEN/ Faulkner Award, and for its equally

stunning successor, *The Age of Shiva*. *The New York Times* called his work "sweepingly ambitious, captivating," and "fearless." Both novels are poetic, luminous ruminations on life in contemporary India, richly textured with backdrops woven of Hindu mythology, popular Indian culture, and political upheaval. Suri is also a full professor in the Department of Mathematics and Statistics at the University of Maryland, where he specializes in Numerical Analysis, a field of applied mathematics related to the construction of algorithms.
