



Shortz holds the world's only known college degree in Enigmatology.


He is the founder of the World Puzzle Championship (and captain of the U.S. team), a founder of



On Thursday, April 6, 2006, Lansky, the




His books, Mohawk, The Risk Pool, Nobody's Fool, Straight Man,

and *The Whore's Child*, are lovingly drawn depictions of working-class America in the late 20th century.

Russo won the 2002 Pulitzer Prize for *Empire Falls*; according to the judges, Russo "has demonstrated a peerless affinity for the human tragicomedy, and with this stunning new novel he extends even further his claims on the small-town, blue-collar heart of the country."

"We'll never know any place better than the place we grew up,

and no place, I suspect, will ever be more important to us, at least in terms of our imaginative lives," says Russo. "For that reason there's something tragic in the understanding that many kids from small towns have—that in order to be a success in life, they'll have to leave; to remain behind would be an admission of failure. For many, it means leaving their heart's home."
